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THE HISTORY OF COPPER POT

Copper pot still distilled gin has a rich history dating back to the 17th century, when Dutch and English distillers began experimenting with new methods of producing gin. TASTING NOTE

London copper is a gin made in the London Dry style. A top-quality gin that not only reflects the past but elevates that style to its highest possible expression. Because this gin is tribute to the past we wanted this to translate into its flavour and make the gin in the way it would have been made in the past but with a modern twist as well. On the nose it displays well-balanced aromas of juniper and citrus, with the latter, and particularly those of lemon and orange peel, particularly pronounced. As a result, the gin is very fragrant and distinctly fresh. It is mild and pleasant on the palate, with the citrus notes making it fresh and elegant, whilst the aftertaste displays subtle notes of juniper and delicate spices.
